We look forward to continuing these important discussions and working together to create a brighter future for our aging population!





Bringing Equity and Social Justice to Reproductive Health Services in NW Philadelphia

Philadelphia Midwife Collective (PMC) is an established, independent, non-profit midwifery practice, born in 2017 and offering community-based care in the home and hospital settings. Based in Northwest Philadelphia, PMC also partners with the Jefferson-Einstein Healthcare Network and is proud to have privileges at its local hospitals in Philadelphia and Montgomery counties. PMC is committed to the intentional provision of care within a collective framework, and it partners with local practitioners and specialists to provide comprehensive reproductive health care throughout the lifespan, including aynecologic care, birth services, postpartum and infant feeding support, menopausal care, family planning, and well-person primary care. PMC was founded on the principles of safety, accessibility, and affirmation using the midwifery model of care. PMC is committed to reproductive justice, sexual health and birth options, and serving systemically marginalized communities including people of color, LGBTQIA+ clients, and low-income individuals who might otherwise receive bias care within larger medical systems.





Today, PMC is a community of practitioners with a shared mission: to provide accessible reproductive and well-person care while nurturing a space for evidence-based, full-spectrum support throughout the reproductive lifespan.

PMC plans on expanding access to safe out of hospital birth options by opening a freestanding birth center in Northwest Philadelphia in 2025. As of now and in contrast to most US metropolitan cities, Philadelphia has only five hospital maternity units and no birth center options within city limits. Birth centers function under the evidence-based assumption that for low-risk pregnant people, birth is not typically a medical event and, in most cases, does not require hospitalization; they are proven to be a safe and cost-effective model of care. PMC's vision is to serve the community, combat the current maternal morbidity and mortality rates, and help parents, babies and families thrive.

2024 Elissa Messori Jacobsen Nursing Award

Foundation for Health Equity and Chestnut Hill Hospital gathered in June to celebrate the 2024 recipient of the Elissa Messori Jacobsen Nursing Award – **Britney Adgate!**

The Elissa Messori Jacobsen Nursing Award Fund was established by Dr. and Mrs. Divo Messori to celebrate the life of their daughter. Elissa, a nurse on the 3rd floor, and Dr. Divo Messori, a surgeon, were both dedicated and beloved staff at Chestnut Hill Hospital. Elissa died in 2001 after battling breast cancer.

"Doing this, helping others, means something and helps to get through the loss," said Dr. Messori at the first Nursing Awards Presentation on May 8, 2002. "It's a measure of comfort. There is pleasure in giving." Continued gratitude to Dr. Messori for his unwavering support and commitment to the nursing profession, and continued gratitude to all nurses for the critical work you do!
